




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Love Lives Here



Just when we thought we were through one of the busiest and most challenging years, our team at NVDPL faced a new set of obstacles to overcome in 2021. As the pandemic entered its 2nd year, our staff adapted to change after change. As our Lynn Valley community was dealt an unimaginable tragedy, our staff united with compassion and care—for each other and for our community.

Despite every hurdle, our staff connected with our community. We implemented an Indigenous land acknowledgement statement, eliminated late fines, expanded service hours, opened year-round on Sundays, and resumed in-person storytimes! We were honoured with the BCLA Building Better Communities Award in partnership with North Shore libraries and the BCLA Community Story Award.

Our staff shared. We celebrated and honoured diverse voices. We co-hosted the first virtual edition of the North Shore Writers Festival and the first-ever North Shore Reads community book club. We launched new digital resources and developed a summer book subscription for teens!

And throughout it all, our staff inspired. We opened up our doors to StoryLab and hosted NVDPL's first ever Digital Storyteller-in-Residence program. We launched community-focused special collections, from puzzles to e-readers and more.

We're grateful to the District of North Vancouver for their financial support and partnership. We're thankful for additional financial support from the Province of BC and for the NVDPL funding special initiatives and collections.

We are incredibly grateful to the many hands and hearts that supported our community, volunteers, and staff in the wake of tragedy. Your gracious gifts—of art, of community, of emotional support and more—helped us during a time of community healing, and your generosity of spirit from near and far was deeply felt by our community in North Vancouver. Thank you.

Onsite service is wonderful, especially during the extreme heat dome recently. Without the library cooling centre, I would have been quite ill. I love my Library!









Goodbye, late fines!

Go on, do your happy dance—we officially eliminated late fines for overdue material in May 2021! Daily late fines, while intended to encourage the return of library materials, actually created financial and social barriers that discouraged library use—and these barriers disproportionately impacted people in our community who need library services the most. All NVDPL cardholders were given a clean slate on late fines! We are grateful to the Library Board and North Vancouver District Council for supporting the elimination of late fines at NVDPL. If you haven't come see us in a while due to fines on your account, drop by and say hello!

Celebrating diversity, self-love, and PRIDE!

NVDPL staff have a vision to support the building of inclusive communities through innovative and connection-building programming. All throughout Pride Month in Vancouver, library staff curated information and resources for interactive displays, featuring books, recorded book and film recommendations, and more.

NVDPL also hosted its first-ever Drag Queen Storytime, in partnership with the Storytelling with Drag Queens Foundation. Our community was overflowing with interest and support for the child-friendly stories and songs. We're thrilled to provide opportunities for our staff and communities to embrace self-love and celebrate diversity with PRIDE.

North Shore Reads

Initiated by NVDPL staff member Sara, the first ever North Shore Reads event was brought to life in collaboration with North Vancouver City Library and West Vancouver Memorial Library. Following the "One City, One Book" model, the event brought together 418 attendees from the North Shore and beyond for a special evening with Dr. Suzanne Simard, Shelagh Rogers, and Tsitsayxemaat Rebecca Duncan. This year's featured book was Finding the Mother Tree by UBC researcher Dr. Suzanne Simard. The book is an illuminating look into the mysterious and inspiring world of trees, paired with personal and heartfelt inclusions about Dr. Simard's own life. Many local residents care deeply about nature, forests, environmental issues and climate change, making the book a natural choice for the inaugural event.

Honouring and Celebrating Indigenous Voices

To support and honour our commitment to Reconciliation, NVDPL officially adopted its land acknowledgement recognizing and respecting the Indigenous Peoples and communities that have always been, and continue to be, in relationship with this land. The statement pays homage to the deep-rooted history of the land that we are privileged to live, work, and play on, and expresses deep gratitude for the opportunity to connect community, share knowledge and inspire stories on the traditional territories of the Skwx wú7mesh (Squamish),

and səl'ilwəta? l/Selilwitulh (Tsleil-Waututh), and xwməθkwəy'əm (Musqueam) First Nations.

On Canada's National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, NVDPL libraries opened their doors for learning and reflection. Community members were invited to create personal Reconciliation Commitment Bracelet, attend a 'Getting Started with Reconciliation' program, as well as observe a moment of silence at 2:15pm to pay respects to the victims of the residential school system and their families following the discoveries across Canada of the unmarked graves of children.

In partnership with North Shore Libraries and Ta7talíya Nahanee, over 175 community members took part in an educational program on how to work to decolonize relations to this land, work and community. A traditional welcome was given by Chief Janice George, and the event was hosted by NVDPL Board Chair, Lara Greguric.

NVDPL remains committed to developing meaningful opportunities for our community to unite in shared learning, and move forward in good relations on their Reconciliation journeys.

Devices, puzzles, and games—oh my!

Libraries have always been about sharing resources—we're proud to offer books, films, magazines, accessible formats, and digital resources. In 2021, we added puzzles, Dungeons and Dragons Starter Kits, and Kobo eReaders to the menu and these new collections are flying off the shelves!

By being responsive to our community, we can support learning and information sharing in a variety of ways—and in the ways that our community needs. And we get to do it by fulling living our values of embracing exploration, creativity, and fun!

Teen Book Boxes

Thanks to the clever thinking of Jessie, Teen Engagement Librarian, NVDPL gifted 62 book subscription boxes to teens in the summer. Each box included a craft, tasty treats, stickers, pins and other swag, an Advanced Reader Copy of a teen novel (theirs to keep), and five books checked out and ready to read. The subscriptions 'sold out' quickly and dedicated teens read a whopping 310 teen books all summer long. Not only did they keep teens engaged and reading over the summer, but one teen even said they were introduced to their favourite book through the Book Box: music to a librarian's ears!

Made in StoryLab

This summer marked a new first for our Library: we hosted NVDPL's first **Digital Storyteller** in **Residence**, Sahand Mohajer. Sahand, a Persian-Canadian artist and filmmaker, spent the summer connecting with individuals with intersecting connections to the North Shore. The result? A short film featuring the unique and personal stories of six individuals that celebrate a broader, more inclusive, and more vibrant understanding of the history of British Columbia. This project was made possible by support from the Province of BC's Multiculturalism Grants

Program, with additional partnership support from the North Shore Multicultural Society. Watch 'Celebrating BC 150+: Stories of the North Shore'.

NVDPL Youth Services staff member Celeste also developed an **introduction to podcasting** program with local youth. The delightful series of podcasts had kids sharing all kinds of life hacks. They shared favourite literature characters, literacy tips for kids by kids, the best kind of weather, and more—and wow, do kids say the darnedest things!
